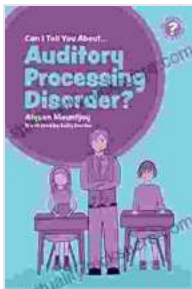

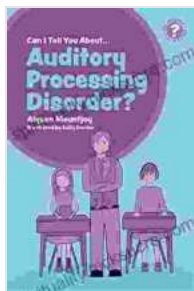
What is the Prognosis for Auditory Processing Disorder?

- * Create a supportive and understanding environment for your child.

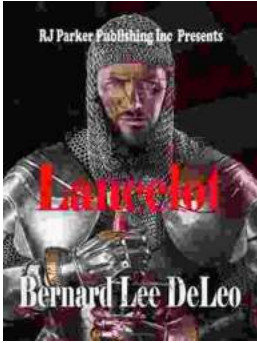


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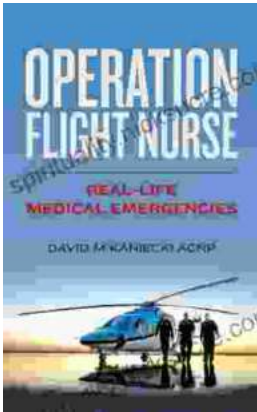
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
