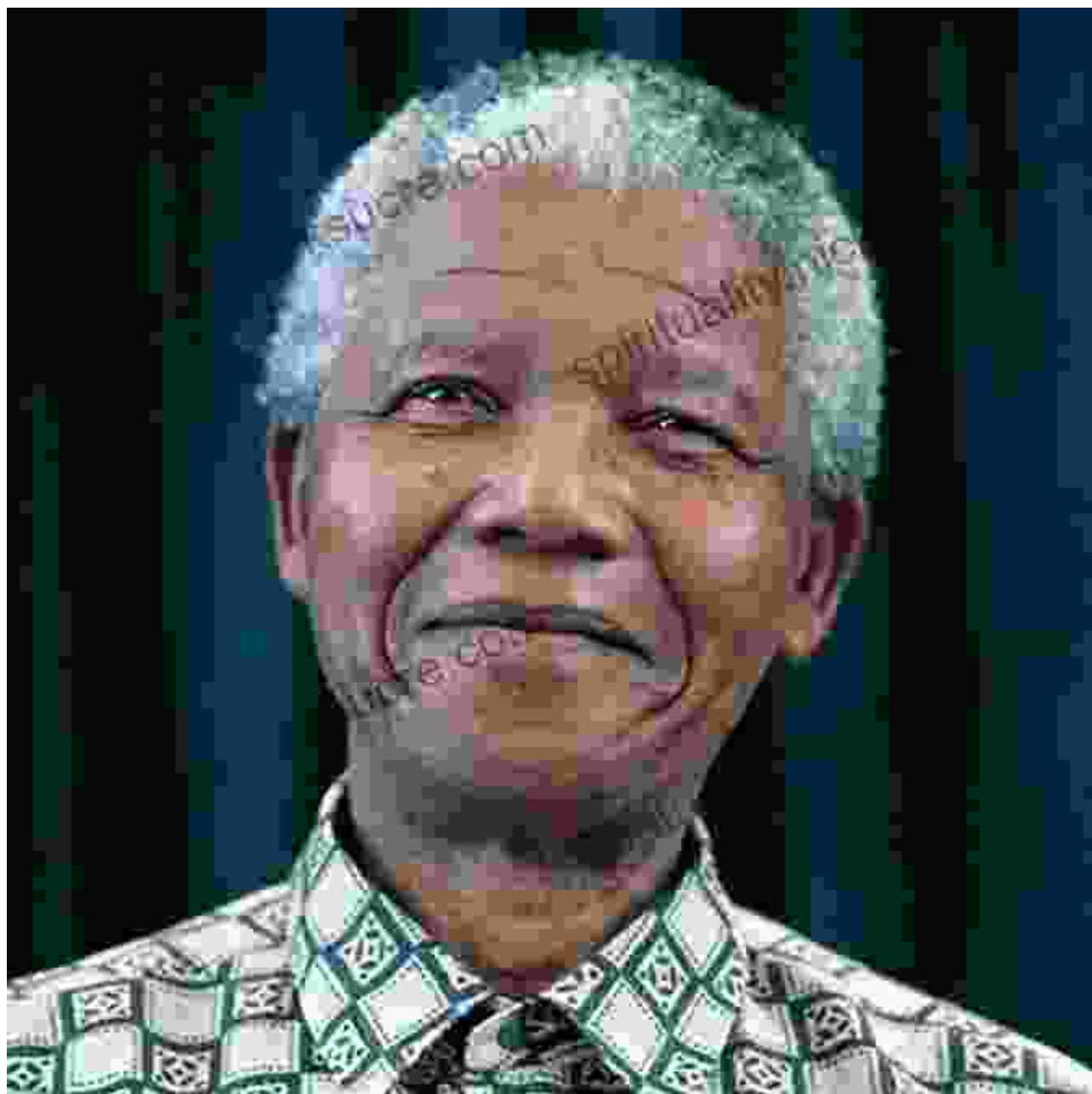
1. Steve Jobs: Embrace Innovation and Pursue Your Passion
