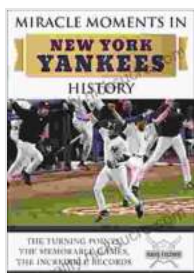
Babe Ruth's Called Shot

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Billy Martin's Pine Tar Incident

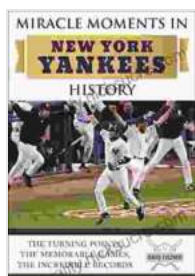
Derek Jeter's Flip Play

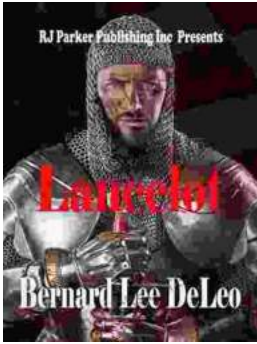
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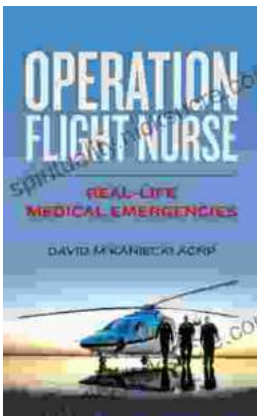
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
