Surfing Lingo: A Dictionary of Surfing Terms



- Ding: A small dent or scratch in a surfboard.
- Fin: A small, surfboard-mounted device that helps to stabilize the board and provide lift.
- Leash: A rope that attaches a surfer to their surfboard.
- Longboard: A type of surfboard that is typically longer than 9 feet.
- Shortboard: A type of surfboard that is typically shorter than 7 feet.
- Surfboard: A board that is designed for surfing.
- Tail: The back end of a surfboard.
- Nose: The front end of a surfboard.
- Aerial: A maneuver in which a surfer jumps into the air and performs a trick.
- Cutback: A maneuver in which a surfer turns their board back towards the wave.
- Floater: A maneuver in which a surfer rides along the top of a wave.
- Layback: A maneuver in which a surfer leans back on their board.
- Ollie: A maneuver in which a surfer jumps into the air and lands on their board, without using their hands.
- Pop-up: The act of standing up on a surfboard.
- Rail grab: A maneuver in which a surfer grabs the rail of their board.
- Roll-in: A maneuver in which a surfer catches a wave from the inside.

- Snap: A maneuver in which a surfer quickly turns their board.
- Tube ride: A maneuver in which a surfer rides inside a barrel.
- Charging: Surfing big waves or challenging conditions.
- Grommet: A young surfer.
- Kook: A beginner surfer who is not yet familiar with the rules of the lineup.
- Lineup: The area where surfers wait for waves.
- Local: A surfer who lives near a particular surf spot.
- Pipeline: A famous surf break in Hawaii.
- Priority: The right of way to catch a wave.
- Stoked: Excited or happy about surfing.
- Wipeout: A fall off a surfboard.

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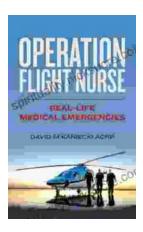


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
